Overview 1

2021 Census

- **Took place in March 2021** when England was under COVID-19 restrictions.
- **95% response rate**, with most households responding online (96%).
- **LAs worked with ONS** to get the best from the process (LA Partnership Plan).
- **New questions in 2021** including sexual orientation, gender ID (both voluntary) and armed forces.
- **Changes to others** including ethnicity, central heating fuel, marital/Civil Partnership status.
- **Geographies Updated** Changes to Output Areas (OAs), Middle-layer Super Output Areas (MSOAs) and Lower-layer Super Output Areas (LSOAs). Data output for new wards (SDC* allowing).

Overview 2

- **Data delivered late:** the majority of standard tables have been published and there are new features including a flexible table builder, online mapping and profiling tools, etc.
- **We have published** a set of '*Topic Summary*' and '*Ready Made*' tables for Camden and area profiles for Camden and wards. The latter are available for bespoke areas on request.
- **Work will continue** to expand available tables and further analysis of census data.
- **Ad hoc census data requests** drive further and more detailed analysis.
- **Responded to ONS** consultation on the future of population statistics (including census).


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Overview - What's in the census?

- **The Census covers a wide range of data about population, dwellings and households; about migration and the jobs and industries people work in.**
– nationally, regionally, by local authority and down to local areas.
- **What kind of data you might find' in the Census** examples include:
 - Tenure by ethnic group by sex/age • Ethnic Group by age/sex • Religion by age/sex • Household composition by age • Accommodation type by overcrowding • Tenure by availability of cars/vans • Migration of whole households or people • Migration by area of origin/destination • Tenure by overcrowding indicator • Disability or long-term illness by age/sex • Provision of unpaid care • Distance travelled to work by age, or by car/van availability, or by occupation • Economic activity status by ethnic group • General health by tenure by age • Number of bedrooms by accommodation type by age of dependent children •
- **In fact, almost any question asked in the census can be cross-tabulated with any other ... with the simple proviso ... that NO individual person or household may be identified. Thus, Census data can ONLY be produced to provide 'safe' output statistics.**

2021 Census Data releases

- **2021 Census 'First Results'** were published on 28 June 2022: Local Authority population & households.
- **'Topic Summary' (single variable) tables** were published November 2022 to February 2023 [\[link\]](#)
- **'Ready Made' (multi-variate tables)** were published spring/summer 2023 [\[link\]](#)
- **Other more specialist data** Recently: Small Population outputs (200+ people); Workplace, Workday (daytime), Origin-Destination migration and travel-to-work. Other Alternative Population Bases to come.



New topics and updated questions

- **Much of the data collected by censuses** has been standardised over a number of decades, that allows us to measure changes over time ... helped by Camden's overall area that remained largely the same for last 6 censuses. Link to latest [2021 Census household questionnaire](#) (paper version).
- **The census also adapts over time** to best reflect the changes in society, with either **new** questions or **changes** to existing ones:

The 2021 Census included new questions on:

- Sexual orientation (voluntary, 16+ only)
- Gender identity (voluntary, 16+ only)
- Armed forces veterans

The 2021 Census includes adjustment to some questions, including:

- Ethnic group (new *White Roma* group)
- Central heating (to include types of fuel)
- Marital and civil partnerships (extended to include same sex marriage)

Geography mismatches explained

- **Wards and the ONS 'statistical' boundaries** (MSOA/LSOA/OA) have different origins and **do not share the same boundaries!**
- **Wards boundaries** are determined by the Local Government Boundary Commission, with the aim to provide equal access of local government voters to their elected politicians. Most Camden wards have 3 members per ward, some are 2 Member wards. Thus, ward populations vary widely:
from **6,389** in Camden Town ward to **12,453** in Primrose Hill ward (2021 Census)
- **Statistical geographies** were established by ONS after the 2001 Census, to create a set of areas with similar populations, so that areas could more easily be compared. The areas are created automatically from census data, using a set of rules about their size. There is a hierarchy of statistical geographies:
 - **Census Output Areas** (OAs) are collections of postcodes and are the lowest level of standard outputs from the census - average size 400 persons. **Uses: census data.**
 - **Lower-layer Super Output Areas** (LSOAs) are aggregations of OAs to areas of approx. 1,500 persons. **Uses: small area data (ONS, DWP) and Indices of Deprivation.**
 - **Middle-layer Super Output Areas** (LSOAs) are aggregations of OAs to areas of approx. 3,500 persons: **Uses: tend to be used by NHS as lowest geography for data.**

Geography changes

- **However: Geographies change over time**

Camden borough boundary has remained (mostly) the same since it was formed in 1965.

Camden wards changes in **1978**, **2002** and lastly in **2022** (2021 Census data is on 2022 wards).

Camden MSOAs 2001=28; 2011=28 (no change); 2021=27

Camden LSOAs 2001=133; 2011=133 (no change); 2021=130

Camden OAs 2001=734; 2011=749; 2021=751

The statistical geographies only change by dividing or amalgamating.

Where changes occur, the new areas are given new names/codes.


There is a good degree of stability from this approach.

- Apart from the 2021 Census which provides data for both statistical (primary) geographies and wards (secondary 'best fit') geographies, other sources may take some time to catch up. **Ward data may be more difficult to obtain in future.**

Geography and census data


- **Not all census data is available at all geographical levels.**
Generally, the higher the geography (size of area) the more detailed the data available,
... the smaller the area, the lesser the detail (or none at all!).
- **Comparisons with previous censuses can only be done where the data has been best-fitted to one geography,** e.g. fitting 2011 Census and 2021 Census data to 2022 wards.

2021 Census: Population Density by ward



2021 Census: Population Density by Middle-layer Super Output Area (MSOA), with 2022 wards superimposed




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Camden LSOAs: with data

2021 Census: Population Density by Lower-layer Super Output Area (LSOA), with 2022 wards superimposed




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Camden OAs: with data

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2021 Census 'Ready Made' tables

- Ready Made tables are multi-variate, cross-tabulations, that display complex census data e.g. Ethnic group x Tenure x Sex x Age.
- 'Ready Made' are equivalent to the 'Detailed Characteristics' and 'Local Characteristics' tables from the 2011 Census.
- Cross-tabs provide data that is used by the Council to best understand our local communities, housing and local economy; to monitor change; to aid policy formulation and to adjust policy via evidence-based research.
- [Ready Made Table Index](#) provides a list of 186 available tables (currently) with links to data already downloaded and tabulated for Camden, London, and England. All available on Open Data Camden and provided with an 'equality group' indicator.

Data limitations

- The **'Ready Made'** tables have been produced by ONS as a **'one size fits all'**. This doesn't always give us what we want.
 - Example. Ethnic group tables** give detailed breakdowns of *White* ethnic groups, but only gives summary totals for all other groups – see right =>
 - Example. Age groupings** are not always sensible.
- These and other shortcomings can usually be overcome** by using the Flexible Table Builder (see below) but it is time-consuming.
- Some specific populations that we want data for is still not available** as cross-tabulations or the Flexible Table Builder, e.g. Somali. This is very frustrating.

Guide to using 2021 Census statistics in Camden

The 2021 Census was undertaken on Sunday 21 March 2021.

This guide will show you how to access data for Camden or other areas. It will explain about the different types of census data and about the geography/areas for which it is available.

Warning

The 2021 Census was conducted during a period of COVID-19 lockdown restrictions which affected the number of people living in Camden. At that time, many people were absent who would normally be present – including many students, younger workers, EU nationals and people with access to alternative or second addresses. Although people may have subsequently returned, they will not be seen in the 2021 Census data. ONS hope to make an estimate of those missed and to include these as an adjustment into their revised Mid-year Estimates of population series (an experimental process, possibly subject to revision).

ONS is adamant that the 2021 Census process was robust, and their methods worked well to estimate the people living in Camden at the time of the census. It recognises the unique time that the census took place, so results will not reflect completely the people resident prior to the pandemic.

Using census data Usually census data is best used in terms of proportions rather than absolute numbers, e.g. % tenure, or % people with long-term illness or disability. This is especially so for the 2021 Census data that has been affected by people missing from the population, but also allows the comparison between areas that vary in population size.

Caution is advised using the 2021 Census statistics for Camden.

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ONS Census resources

- **Create a custom dataset** is a flexible table builder on the ONS website. A little clunky to use! Follow the instructions to create some unique outputs.

It takes a little time to learn how it works:

- Choose a table population
- Choose the geography
- Choose variables (and level of detail)
- Outputs a flat CSV file. Knowledge of Excel pivot tables helps to turn output into tables.



Create a custom dataset

We group Census 2021 data together based on who or what the information is about, for example, people or households. We make population types from these groups or subsets of them. For example, people who are usually resident in England or Wales make up the population type usual residents. [Read about the measurements we used for Census 2021 data.](#)

Select population type

- All households
Either one usual resident living alone or a group of people who share cooking and living facilities, where that group includes at least one usual resident.
- All Household Reference Persons
A person who serves as a reference point, mainly based on economic activity, to characterise a whole household.
- All usual residents in communal establishments
A usual resident who lives in a place that provides managed full-time or part-time supervision of residential accommodation such as a university hall of residence, care home or prison.
- All usual residents in households
A person who usually lives in England or Wales, and in a household.
- All usual residents
The main population base for census statistics. It includes people usually living in England and Wales and excludes non-UK born short-term residents and visitors.



Initial analysis of 'Topic Summary' data

- **The 2021 Census *Topic Summary*** tables are simple, single variable tables. These are equivalent to the *Key Statistics* and *Quick Statistics* produced from the 2011 Census.
- **The following analysis looks at a range of the topic areas** to show characteristics of the population and housing in 2021 and comparison with 2011 Census.

Remember ...

- The census data reflects the time at which it was taken during COVID-19 restrictions.
- People normally expected to be in Camden may have been elsewhere, particularly students (domestic and international) and working aged people (isolating elsewhere or furloughed).
- The census counted and estimated for the people who were in Camden on 23 March 2021.

Quick reveals 1

2021 Census 'reveals'

- Camden lost population (-4.7%) and households (-4.9%).
- Generally fewer under 50s and more over 50s by proportion.
- Tenure: largest change was to private rented (+3.3pp).
- Household composition: drop in % 1-person households; larger increase in % 1-family HHs.
- Access to a car/van: more households car/van-free in 2021 (64%, compared to 61%).
- Lower % people provided unpaid care overall (but higher % provided up to 20 hours a week).

Quick reveals 2


- **Sexual orientation: 6.9% in Camden identified as gay, lesbian, bi or other sexual orientation** (note. a new voluntary question for 16+; likely under-estimate due to household questionnaire).
- **Gender ID: 0.8% of Camden residents aged 16+ had different sex to that registered at birth** (note. a new voluntary question for 16+; some data for some areas being investigated by ONS).
- **English proficiency: just 3% of people say they don't speak English well or not at all.**
- **Top languages spoken after English: French, Bengali, Spanish, Italian, Arabic, Portuguese.**
- **Largest ethnic groups: *White British* (35.4%), *White Other* (21.6%), *Bangladeshi* (6.8%), *Black African* (6.8%).**

Population size

- Population Size** On census day (21 March 2021), the 'usually resident' population of Camden was estimated as 210,100. By population, Camden ranks 26th in London, and 87th of all 307 local authority areas in England.
- Population change 2011 to 2021** Camden has seen a reduction in the usual resident population 2011-2021 of 10,300 (-4.7%). This fall in population contrasts with a increases of +7.7% across Greater London and +6.6% for England. Only 2 other boroughs saw population falls: Westminster and Kensington & Chelsea.
- Population density** in Camden in 2021 was 96.4 persons per hectare (9,641 persons per Km²). Camden has the 9th highest population density in London. Camden is slightly less densely populated than in 2011 when the density was 101 persons/hectare.


2021 Census Usual Resident Population

Population change


- Population change 2011 to 2021** Camden has seen a reduction in the usual resident population 2011-2021 of -10,300 (-4.7%). This fall in population contrasts with an increase of +7.7% across Greater London and +6.6% for England.
- Within London**, Tower Hamlets saw the fastest growth (+22.1%) while Kensington & Chelsea and Westminster showed the largest percentage population decline, with -9.6% and -6.9% respectively. Overall, higher growth was seen for Outer London boroughs (+9.2%) than Inner London boroughs (+5.3%).
- These patterns are likely to reflect a range of different factors, including levels of housing development across boroughs, but may well have been affected by the pandemic and Brexit-related impacts on the 2021 Census estimate, as well as the possibility of differential undercounting.



Historical perspective

- **Population change 1801 to 2021** Over the past 220 years of the census, Camden has seen a great deal of change. Being at the heart of London and with room to expand into the northern suburbs, the area covered by the current borough of Camden grew rapidly in the 19th century and reached a peak in 1901 with 377 thousand residents.
- **Through most of the 20th century Camden lost population**, initially with slum clearances and then accelerating post-WWII with the New Towns policy of the 1950s and 1960s. Camden's population reached a low point in 1991 at 165 thousand – less than half its peak. The population recovered and increased rapidly into the 21st century to 220,300 in 2011.
- **Camden's drop in population in 2021 may be a blip in the series due to complications with 2021 Census.**

Census Population of Camden 1801-2021




Dwellings & households

- **Dwellings are the total number of properties – dwelling spaces. Most are occupied.** Total dwellings in Camden in 2021 Census = 108,236. The number has increased by 8.4% since 2011.
- **Census households** Defined as 1 person living alone or a group of people (not necessarily related), living at the same address who share cooking facilities and a living room or dining area, i.e. a social construct rather than a physical one.
- **The 2021 Census estimated 92,758 households in Camden** A fall of -4,776 (-4.9%) since 2011.
- **The large difference between dwellings and households indicates unoccupied dwellings** It is likely that some people and households were temporarily away during the census (e.g. students, furloughed or migrant workers, but some will have been in the census). It can also be addresses used by non-usual residents (visitors, short-term migrants), used as company lets, investment properties, or for 'AirBnB'-style short-term lets.




Age

- **Camden has a young age profile** buoyed by a large university student and younger working-age population, rather than by children. Median age is 34 years, compared to London (35) and to England (40).
- **Camden has relatively fewer children** aged under 15 years (14.4%), compared with Greater London (18.1%) or England (17.4%)
- **Young people and the younger working aged** (15-44) in Camden make up over half the population (51.1%), compared to 46.3% for Greater London and 38.4% in England.
- **Camden fewer residents aged 45 and over** (34.4%) compared to England (44.2%) but similar to Greater London (35.5%),
- **11.9% of Camden residents were aged 65+** compared with 18.4% for England, though similar level to Greater London (11.9%).
- **The proportion of 75+** (5.3%) is the same for Camden and London, but smaller than the proportion for England (8.6%).




Age structure change 2011-2021

- **The main differences are the decreased proportions in the age groups under 50.**
- There have been decreases in the proportion of under 50s, except for ages 10-15 and 16-19.
- The largest decrease is in the 25-34 age group.
- The decrease in the 0-4 age group is consistent with the fall in the number of births over the last decade.
- **There have been increased proportions in all age groups over the age of 50.**
- The largest of the increased proportion is for the 50-64 age group, from 15.4% to 16.3%.
- People aged 60+ are the post-war 'baby bulge'. The increase in proportions in these age groups are indicative of the ageing population.



Tenure

- Household tenure in Camden remains balanced between home-owners 30%, social renters 34% and private renters 36%.
- The proportions (%) of social rented and private rented have increased, with social rented increasing 0.6 percentage points and private rented by 3.3 points since 2011.
- The number of home-owners and social rented has decreased over the decade, but the larger fall in home-owners has meant that the social rented proportion increased even though the absolute number has fallen.
- The number of shared-owners remains small. The proportion in shared-ownership is less than 1% and has changed by 0.1 percentage points over the decade.
- Although living rent-free appears to have dramatically decreased, the context is that many people in the 2011 Census who selected this response did so erroneously, thinking that they did not pay rent as it was paid by Housing Benefit. Issue addressed in the 2021 question.




Household composition

- **Overall household composition** in Camden in 2021 is predominantly **one-family households** (49%) and **one-person households** (39%), with **other households** (12%).
- **Proportions (%) have changed since 2011**
 - ↑ one-family households 49% (was 43% in 2011).
 - ↓ one-person households 39% (was 41% in 2011).
 - ↓ other households 12% (was 17% in 2011).
- **Detailed household composition** shows:
 - 11% are one-person households aged 66+.
 - 23% are households with dependent children.
 - 8% are households with non-dependent children.
 - 11% are lone-parent households, just over half of which (56%) contain dependent children.
 - 16% of couple households contain neither dependent nor non-dependent children.
 - 10% of households contain either all students, or unrelated people aged 66+.
 - In 2021 there are slightly more households with dependent children (+290) than in 2011.




Detailed Household Composition (%)


1-person households



Country of birth

- **Some 109,900 Camden residents said they were born in England.** This represented 52.3% of the population. The figure has decreased from just under 119,600 in 2011, which at the time comprised 54.3% of the population.
- **Non-EU European countries** (other than the UK and Turkey) **were the next most represented**, with just over 6,400 Camden residents reporting one of these countries as their country of birth (3.1%). This figure was up from around 5,700 in 2011, which at the time represented 2.6% of the population.
- **The number of Camden residents born in United States fell** from around 6,300 in 2011 (2.8% of the local population) to just over 5,900 in 2021 (2.8%).
- **The proportion of people born in France has increased** from 1.7% in 2011 to 2.5% in 2021.

Ethnic group


- Apart from **White British (44%)**, the largest ethnic groups in Camden are **Other White (22%)**, **Bangladeshi (6.8%)** and **Black African (6.8%)**.

Compared with 2011:

- The proportion of people from **Black, Asian and other minority ethnic groups** has increased from 34% to 40%.
- There has been increases in the proportion of all of the **Mixed, Asian and Other** ethnic groups, plus in the **Other White** and **Black African** groups.
- There has been a reduction in the proportion of **White British, White Irish, Black Caribbean and Other Black** ethnic groups:
 - **White British** from 44% to 35% in 2021.


Religion

- **Religion was a voluntary question.** However, it was well responded to by residents in both 2011 Census (90.4%) and 2021 Census (91.1%).
- **No religion** More than a third (34.9%) of people in Camden identified as having 'no religion' in 2021. This is 5.5 percentage points higher than 2011.
- **Christian is the most common religion.** The proportion of people identifying as Christian has fallen 7.1 percentage points from 2011 (38.5%) to 31.4% in 2021.
- **Muslims are the second largest religious group** 16.1% in 2021, having grown from 13.8% in 2011.
- **Jewish is the 3rd largest religion** 4.8% in 2021, a slight fall from 5.1% in 2011.
- **Other religions are smaller by proportion:** Hindu (1.9%), Buddhist (1.1%), Sikh (0.2%) and all other religions (0.9%).

Note. 2011 Census data on religion for Camden, Islington and Tower Hamlets was published with errors. The data presented here are corrected figures. ONS only provided a correction for religion by age and sex at local authority level. All published tables that includes religion state the old, uncorrected figures. It is not possible for users to apply a post-tabular correction across the range of census tables in a consistent manner and therefore the error remains in those published tables.




Languages spoken

- The census measure languages spoken for all residents aged 3+. English is the main language spoken by the vast majority (79%) population.
- The detailed 2021 Census classification for Camden counted speakers of 85 different languages (including 3 forms of sign language).
- Ranked, the most spoken languages (apart from English) in Camden are: French (10.5%), Bengali (9.4%), Spanish (8.1%), Italian (7.1%), Arabic (5.4%), Portuguese (4.6%), Chinese (other than Mandarin or Cantonese (4.3%) and Somali (3.8%).
- Though measured separately, **Chinese languages aggregated would make them the 5th largest group of languages spoken (7%)**: comprising Mandarin (4.1%), Cantonese (1.2%) and all other Chinese languages (4.3%)
- **Change since 2011** when the ranking was Bengali, French, Spanish, Italian, Somali, German, Arabic, Albanian, Portuguese and Polish.


2021 Top 10 Languages spoken (% , excluding English)




Sexual Orientation

- A new question in 2021, **Sexual orientation was a voluntary question to people aged 16+**, with 89.5% of Camden people providing a response. This compares with 90.5% in London and 92.5% nationally (England & Wales).
- **82.6% of people in Camden identified themselves as straight or heterosexual** compared to 86.2% in London and 89.4% nationally.
- **3.7% of Camden people identified themselves as gay or lesbian.** Compared to 2.2% in London and 1.5% nationally.
- **2.5% of Camden people identified as bisexual.** Compared to 1.5% in London and 1.3% nationally.
- **0.7% of Camden people identified with other sexual orientations.** Compares to 0.5% in London and 0.3% nationally.




Disability/long-term illness

- A question on **disability/long-term illness affecting day-to-day activity** has been asked since 1991, with 2-stage response (limited 'a lot' or 'a little') introduced in 2011. Broadly comparable in 2021.
- **In Camden in 2021** 15.2% reported having a disability or long-term illness that affected their day-to-day activity, up from 14.4% in 2011.
- **By severity** the proportion of 'limited a lot' fell slightly from 7.0% in 2011 to 6.7% in 2021, while the 'limited a little' proportion grew: 7.4% in 2011 to 8.5% in 2021.
- **Camden ranks 2nd highest in London** by proportion of people with a disability/limiting long-term illness.
- However, within England and Wales' 318 local authorities, Camden's highest ranking is 194th for the proportion of people's activity was 'limited a lot'.





- **7.3% of people* provided unpaid care**, down slightly from 7.9% in 2011 (*usual residents aged 5+).
- **People in Camden provided** similar amounts of unpaid care as London (7.2%) but less than England (8.9%).
- **People providing up to 19 hours (5.2%)** a week was most common, up from 3.9% in 2011.
- **People providing 20-49 hours (1.1%)** a week, down from 1.6% in 2011.
- **People providing over 50 hours (1.5%)** a week, down from 1.8% in 2011.




Access to cars or vans

- More households in Camden (63.6%) are car-free, i.e. DO NOT have access to a car or van up slightly from 61.1% in 2011. Put the other way only 36.4% of Camden households have access to a car or van.
- Levels of car-free households in Camden are much higher than for London (42.1%) or for England (23.4%).
- 30.2% of households has access to 1 car or van.
- 5.2% of households has access to 2 cars or vans.
- 1.0% of households has access to 3+ cars or vans.
